History Abstract Observation Activity – Statues

Materials:

A tray containing:

→ Small Statue of a child

Presentation:

- 1. During circle time, say to the children, "Today, we are going to watch time move."
- 2. The teacher should show the children the small **statue** and say, "This is a **statue**. It is a representation of a child. It is not a real child. It "represents" or looks like a child. Can this **statue** of a child move on its own?"
- 3. After the children and you have discussed this....say, "Today, we are going to play a game called, "Statues."
- 4. The teacher puts the statue in the middle of the circle.
- 5. The teacher should then invite the children to stand up and to slowly start to move around the circle.
- 6. The teacher should tell the children, "When I say, the word statue everyone needs to hold as still as a statue."
- 7. The teacher and the children begin to move around the circle.
- 8. The teacher says, "Statue." The teacher freezes her motions and stops moving. The children copy the teacher and stop moving.
- 9. Now the teacher should wait a few seconds and repeat steps 6 and 7.
- 10. Next, the teacher invites the children to sit back down.
- 11. The teacher says, "Whether we are moving or standing as still as a **statue**, time goes by. Keeping track of time is part of history. **History** is the study about how people, places and things in our world have been recorded on our Earth."

Variations and Extensions:

- 1. Use music.
- 2. Play "musical chairs."
- 3. Use a stopwatch

Points of Interest:

- 1. When we watch time....it can go very slowly.
- 2. When we are doing something....time can go very quickly.

Control of Error:

1. The teacher has explained the activity in a way that the children understand it. This is an abstract idea and very young children will be able to "do" the activity but will not understand it until they are a little older.

Aims:

To be introduced to **History** as the study about how people, places and things in our world have been recorded on our Earth in an abstract way.

Age:

2 ½ and up

Language:

History, statue, time, etc.
